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# Hazard Reduction Burns



from Diamond Beach RFS

Over the next few months the Rural Fire Service may be doing Hazard Reduction Burns, weather permitting.

Hazard reduction is just one way of preparing for bush fires, helping to remove the threat of fire. But it doesn't remove the need for you and your family to be prepared.

There are different types of hazard reduction including controlled burning, mechanical clearing like slashing undergrowth, or even reducing the ground fuel by hand.

If there is a hazard reduction burn planned in the area, take the following steps:

- keep doors and windows closed to prevent smoke entering homes,
- keep outdoor furniture under cover to prevent ember damage
- retract pool covers to prevent ember damage
- remove washing from clothesline
- vehicles must slow down, keep windows up, turn headlights on,
- sightseers must keep away from burns for their own safety
- if you have asthma or a lung condition, reduce outdoor activities



If smoke levels are high and if shortness of breath or coughing develops, take your reliever medication or seek medical advice.

For health information relating to smoke from bush fires and hazard reduction burning visit the NSW Health website or the Asthma Foundation.

If you are thinking of doing a Hazard Reduction Burn at your place, first find out if you need a permit before you light up or you could be in for a hefty fine.

# Black Head Tennis Club

AGM

Black Head Tennis Club will hold the Annual General Meeting (AGM) at the Club House in Wylie Breckenridge Park on Saturday 26th September 2015 at 11:00am. This will be followed up by a barbeque lunch and open tennis at the courts. All are welcome. Former members and families are especially invited to attend.

## A Short History

On the 21/6/1979 a group of people interested in establishing a local tennis club met at the Black Head Surf Club. The meeting commenced at 7:30pm and quickly organised a committee. The first President, Ted Lowe; Vice President, Garry Crocker; Secretary, Carol Lynch; Treasurer, Snow Moy; and Publicity Officer, Mal Browne. The meeting was chaired by Peter Nixon. The new executive discussed fund raising of at least \$5000 for a building fund. The local newspaper ran the story "Manning Shire Council Parks and Reserves would be petitioned for financial help for the construction of tennis courts. The newly formed club will cover Diamond Beach, Red Head and Rainbow Flat residents as a sporting facility. 60 people attended the meeting."

The club decided, due to the cost and availability of ample volunteer labour, the initial court would be an 'antbed' soil type of construction.

By September 1979 meetings were being held in private homes and fund raising well underway. \$2500 was needed

to match a council grant to clear land and prepare an area for the courts. The club was advised that two courts would be built, the club supplying fencing on completion. Permission was given for street stalls to be conducted. Other sporting groups such as Black Head Bowling Club and Black Head SLSC assisted with events at their venues. For small communities they were extremely generous and by July 1980 the club was making ready committees to organise maintenance of court surfaces and playing procedures. Miss Cath Abernethy was accepted as patron and donated a cheque to the club.

By 1980 the club applied for a grant to build a club house. Two payments had been made to Council for past work and fund raising continued. Local newspapers announced the opening day for Black Head Tennis Club, November 16th 1980, with a round robin tournament for Seniors and Juniors.

1981 saw Saturday social tennis introduced for members. At the same time a letter was sent to the State Member re having two synthetic tennis courts - no doubt less work than the original "antbeds." Greater Taree City Council agreed to construct two courts plus fencing and lighting. Mr Mal Brown, in the presidents report at the AGM for June 1983, thanked all supporters in the past year saying, 'the biggest success was 'all weather' surfaces on courts and continued fund raising'.

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### Fish 'n' Tips with Trevor

They're back again, passing our shores only three quarters of their journey on the great ocean migration from Antarctica to the Sunshine Coast of Queensland, so get out your binoculars, find a good vantage point and enjoy the spectacle of these majestic creatures. The whales are now generating more financial return with the tourist dollar than they did when I saw them harvested over fifty years ago. Maybe there will come a time with ever-increasing numbers and the reduction in their food source, their numbers will naturally decline. I have been viewing them gambolling north from the headlands around Newcastle and throwing the line in at Dudley Beach for tailor and pesky salmon and getting a feed of blackfish off the rock wall at Swansea over the past couple of weeks.

Huge seas in mid-June curbed any beach and outside fishing, confining anglers to the rivers and lakes. However, calmer conditions have since enabled enthusiasts to be rewarded with some good catches. Brad, from Tuncurry Tackle reports that there are blackfish and large fat bream aplenty along the walls and among the oyster racks. Beaches and rocks are venues for some large tailor to 4kg at Seven Mile Beach and smaller off Tuncurry and Diamond Beaches.



If you want a good tussle with an extremely strong fighting fish with plenty of grunt for its size – try for drummer off the rocks. Stirred up white water using conji, bread (using a bobby cork), green prawns or abalone gut. Heavy line, solid 2 or 3/0 hook and wind in as quick as you can or they will "rock" you. Skinned and cut into fish fingers, and deep fried – yum.

Off shore, sometimes it is difficult to reach the bottom and fish for long as often you are bitten off by the ravenous leather jacket losing all your gear. Those lucky enough to dodge them have caught good sized snapper off Black Head, trag on the 3 trag grounds and plenty of flathead on the gravel beds.

A friend of my son, both keen divers, snorkelled along the sea wall at Tuncurry in 5 to 6 metres of water to view the marine life. He said there was an abundance of fish, significant being the dozens of mullet lazing in the water. Skilled anglers, using live bait and large lures have landed a few on the last of the run out tide although none of any magnitude. Fishing will begin to quieten down as Spring approaches but we keep trying.

Unfortunately my sister "Winnie" has passed away from her terminal Kidney Disease. My condolences go

to her parents and especially to her grandparents Beryl and Richard. The only consolation is that I am always available for pats and being spoiled!

Keep a watch for ticks and keep up the preventatives over the cooler months as we have seen affected dogs and cats already in June and July. I have already informed you about 2 new products for Fleas and Ticks for dogs. These are Nexgard (1 /mth) and Bravecto (1/3mths). No worries with your pet getting wet with these products and as far as Ticks are concerned, the products are much cheaper than using Frontline or Advantix every 2 wks. Unfortunately, for Tick prevention for those on the dark side, the only product you can safely use is Frontline every 2 wks, even though this is an off label recommendation. Ask your Vets which products they stock and which one they recommend to protect us.

Microchipping us pets is essential for our safe return from wandering, and don't forget that a microchip can migrate from its original insertion point, but can still be found with a thorough scan.

Cat owners are reminded to get your pet vaccinated or a booster done, as there are reports coming out of Sydney of an increase in the number of cats with Feline Enteritis.

Well, I am just going to curl up on my bed during this cold weather and await the sun. It's a tough job, but I am well suited to it! *Lots of licks - TANK*

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## What's On At The Manning Regional Art Gallery

### The art of woodturning to turn heads

Passionate woodturner Phillip Burke will be showing his work at the Manning Regional Art Gallery from this Friday 24 July – 6 September in an exhibition entitled **Turn it Until the Spirit Unfolds**.

Phillip's exhibition captures the imperfections of certain timbers and shows how these can be used to create unique and beautiful pieces. He has used Australian timbers to produce wild edge bowls, kinetic wall art, vases, platters and wall shields, which will all be on display at the gallery from this Friday. He particularly likes to use eucalypt trees as they come in a huge variety of colours and sizes such as the Yellow Box, Brindle Box, Coolabah, Black Butt and Red River Gum.



Phillip developed his passion for woodturning back in the eighties when he purchased his first lathe and from then on, he has always used nature as his source of inspiration. His work is showcased in the Gannon House Gallery at The Rocks, Sydney but he believes in the importance of supporting local businesses so you can also find his pieces at Artisans on the Hill at Tinonee, Manning Spiritual Centre at Wingham and Salty Dog at Coolongolook.



This is a beautiful exhibition that is not to be missed, so be sure to come along to the Manning Regional Art Gallery and check it out. Gallery hours are Wednesday to Saturday, 10am to 4pm, and Sundays, 1pm to 4pm.

### Surf's up at the Gallery

Surfing has become a way of life for many Australians and the Mid North Coast is no different, with some of the best beaches in the state and a prominent surfing culture.

This surfing culture and history will be showcased in Locals Only II, an exhibition held at the Manning Regional Art Gallery from 24 July to 6 September. This anticipated sequel to the popular exhibition held in 2008, Locals Only, will kick off with an opening celebration held at the gallery on Friday 24 July from 6.30pm.

With a historical focus, the exhibition will not only feature photographs of local surfers including the Saltwater Boardriders Club, but aspects of the lifestyle including cars, competitions, old footage, trophies and medals. Part of the display will also recreate the surf shop of the 70s and 80s with clothing, decor and memorabilia. 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# Our Natural World

Big Bad Banksia Men

In her books on the adventures of Snugglepot and Cuddlepie, May Gibbs portrayed the Banksias as the villains of the plot. What an insult for these beautiful native bushes.



In our area you can find several Banksia species- Wallum, Heath (the one with the big long flowers), Coast, Swamp, Large-leaf, Saw and Hill. Banksias were named after Sir Joseph Banks (1743-1820), who, in 1770, was the first European to collect specimens of these plants. But these plants have ancient origins. The fossil forms found in the Kennedy Ranges in WA indicate that Banksias have been around in something like their modern form for 40-50 million years. During this time Australia has drifted north from a position near Antarctica and undergone major climatic changes. Banksias are woody evergreen plants, and range from prostrate shrubs to trees up to 25m tall.

The flowers of the Banksia are very intricate, not your average



five petals and a stamen. The flower heads are made up of hundreds (sometimes thousands) of tiny individual flowers grouped together in pairs. The colour of the flower heads usually ranges from yellow to red. In bud, each flower head appears as a cone of tightly packed elongated narrow tubes. As the flowers open four floral segments are revealed along with a pollen laden stigma that attracts the birds and possums.

The fruits of banksias (called follicles) are hard and woody and are often grouped together to resemble cones (which they are not, - true cones are produced only by conifers). The fruits protect the seeds from foraging animals and from fire. In many species the fruits will not open until they have been burnt or completely dried out. It is these black hairy dried out seed pods that inspired the "big bad banksia men".


The Banksia is able to regrow after bushfires, some have a woody stock (lignotuber) from which they sprout and others regenerate from seed. I remember a Garden Club visit to a house in Darawank where the rear paddock was full of burnt out Banksias regenerating.

If you have not read Snugglepot and Cuddlepie since the kids were little, find it on the shelf and have a read, I chuckled often and marvelled at her choice of characters for our Australian flora, fauna and sea creatures.



## Characteristics of Banksia

Banksia flowers are quite small but they occur in dense clusters which, in some species, can number several thousand individuals. The sequence of opening of each flower goes through several stages:



1. In bud, each flower appears as an elongated narrow tube (the perianth) comprising four segments each having an anther containing pollen at its tip.
2. As the flower opens, the perianth segments separate to reveal a narrow style. Just before the flower fully opens the anthers transfer their pollen to the tip of the style (the stigma)
3. Finally, the style separates from the perianth. At this stage the style and stigma, with attached pollen, is called a 'pollen presenter' (i.e. it is 'presenting' the pollen to a pollinator, usually a bird or small marsupial, which acts as the agent to transfer pollen from one flower to another for fertilisation.

This sequence is shown in the accompanying diagram and is fairly typical of most members of the Proteaceae.

Fossils identified as Banksias or closely related plants have been found in several localities. They occur as pollen grains, leaf and fruit impressions and mummified leaves and fruit. Perhaps the most remarkable fossils are the fruit found in the Kennedy Range (W.A.). Described as a new species (Banksia archaeocarpa), they are like some present day species. The fossil forms indicate that Banksias have been around in something like their modern form for 40-50 million years. During this time Australia has drifted north from a position

near Antarctica and undergone major climatic changes. Banksias are all woody evergreen plants, and range from prostrate shrubs to trees up to 25m tall. Tree forms usually have a single trunk which is often of irregular shape; shrub forms may have one or many stems at ground level. 36 species have a fire-tolerant trunk or a woody stock (lignotuber) from which they sprout after a bush fire. Heavy pruning induces the same response. Trees with this capability have a bark at least 1cm thick. Other species have fire-sensitive stems with thin bark: they are killed by fire and regenerate from seed. They usually will not take heavy pruning.

There are about 73 species - one for almost every situation, their wide range of rich colours making them attractive for gardens. They are also used for Arts & Crafts, the seed heads in particular. "Big Bad Banksia-men" feature in the famous children's stories of author May Gibb.

## Iris Salmon – Diamond Beach

I met with Iris at her home studio in Diamond Beach where her light-filled studio and home is filled with many examples of her artistic skills. Her dogs Toby and Scruffy watched as she tackled her latest work called 'Old English Countryside'.

Iris started her artistic career in 1979 when she attended Taree Technical College and was taught by Phylis Carle. She began painting with poster paints and was "urged on" by the late Ruby Startin and Betty McKenzie to go further and develop her own style. "I was very surprised to sell my first painting to Dr. King of Access Health who was a fellow student in my art class", explained Iris. "By then I was painting in oils and my teachers encouraged me to try new subjects all the time, including portraiture. In fact, I was even able to convince my late husband Charles to attend the classes and be the model for our lessons".

In the late 70's Iris became a member of the Mid North Coast Art Society based in Taree where she painted under the name 'Siri' (Iris spelt backwards). "I really enjoyed the out-door sessions at The Bight, Wingham. We were a group of amateur artists who got on well together and we really had a great time. Obviously some were better artists than others but that didn't stop us helping each other with advice and demonstrating how to improve".

After Iris moved to Diamond Beach she joined the Hallidays Point Senior Citizens Association Friday art classes in 2008. Iris discovered the joys of painting with pastels and acrylics and applied herself to creating many landscapes, seascapes and animal 'portraits'. "I really felt my soul was singing when our tutor Noel Sulman said my work was a great example of 'impressionism'", exclaimed Iris. "I'm always looking for and finding great photos which inspire me to create new works on canvas. Sometimes I mess

up but that's all part of the challenge art presents every artist with". 

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## Cleaning your computer and its components

Cleaning your computer, components, and peripherals help keep everything in good working condition and helps prevent germs from spreading. The picture shows a good example of just how dirty the inside of your computer case can get. In this example, it is obvious that all the dust and dirt is going to prevent proper air flow and may even prevent the fan from working.



### General Cleaning Tips

Below is a listing of suggestions to follow when cleaning any computer components or peripherals as well as tips to help keep a computer clean.

1. Never spray or squirt any liquid onto any computer component. If a spray is needed, spray the liquid onto a cloth.
2. You can use a vacuum to suck up dirt, dust, or hair around the computer. However, do not use a vacuum inside your computer as it generates static electricity that can damage your computer. If you need to use a vacuum inside your computer, use a portable battery powered vacuum or try compressed air.
3. When cleaning a component or the computer, turn it off before cleaning.
4. Be cautious when using any cleaning solvents; some people have allergic reactions to chemicals in cleaning solvents,

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
and some solvents can even damage the case. Try always to use water or a highly diluted solvent.

5. When cleaning, be careful to not accidentally adjust any knobs or controls. Also, when cleaning the back of the computer, if anything is connected make sure not to disconnect the plugs.
6. When cleaning fans, especially smaller fans, hold the fan or place something in-between the fan blades to prevent it from spinning. Spraying compressed air into a fan or cleaning a fan with a vacuum may cause damage or generate a back voltage.
7. Never eat or drink around the computer.

### CD and DVD Disc Cleaning

**Why?** Dirty CDs can cause read errors or cause CDs to not work at all.

**Procedure:** Use a cleaning kit or damp clean cotton cloth to clean CDs, DVDs, and other discs. When cleaning a disc wipe against the tracks, starting from the middle of the CD or DVD and wiping towards the outer side as shown in the picture below. Never wipe with the tracks; doing so may put more scratches on the disc.



**Tip:** If the substance on a CD cannot be removed using water, pure alcohol can also be used. (www.computerhope.com)

Most cars nowadays, have dashboard messages about a wide range of topics, including issues with the braking system, engine oil and coolant levels and on some vehicles, tyre pressures. Your car owner's manual will explain what each lit-up warning message means and what you need to do.

## What weed is that? Free responsible gardening guide

Help avoid the spread of weeds by identifying what's in your garden - pick up your free copy of "Garden Escapees & Other Weeds of Bushland & Reserves".

Many of us think of weeds as pesky unwanted plants sprouting amongst our flowers and in the vegie patch. But you may be surprised to learn that many of the attractive flowering plants, shrubs and vines that we nurture in our urban gardens can escape and pose a threat to our natural environment. Don't be fooled by the likes of nasturtiums, Busy Lizzys, and agapanthus - these are just some of the many common plants classified as weeds that can invade bushland and compete with native flora for space, water, nutrients and light, and alter and destroy habitat for native animals.

About 65% of weeds that invade our bushland and reserves originate from urban gardens. These "garden escapees" are often spread unwittingly - eg. where berries are eaten by birds and animals, or where large volumes of seeds are distributed by wind or water. Weed spread from gardens is also caused by dumping of green waste in bushland and on road reserves, not only contributing to the problem but which is illegal and can attract hefty fines.

To help you identify the weeds in your garden, how they can be controlled, and how you can help protect our natural environment from garden escapees, we're giving away a comprehensive guide which has been produced by Mid North Coast Weeds. The guide also includes images and descriptions for around 150 different weeds that are prevalent in the Manning Valley.

The responsible gardening guide can be picked up for free, at our libraries in Wingham, Taree, Hallidays Point, Old Bar and Harrington, or at the Bucketts Way Landfill.

24/5/2015 9.50am train to Sydney, taxi to Rydges Airport Hotel--very new, modern, efficient.

25/5 Walk to Terminal 1, 7.30am, people luggage, snaking queues for check in, worse for customs! Overload! Three and half Ks to board Virgin at 10am, no time for Duty Free browsing, barely time for toilet stop.

Flight V.G. 1/2 empty. Cousin Claire and I very comfortable, three movies and three meals later, set down L.A. Airport 6.05am, 25th May. Met by Cousin Patsy, shuttle to Airport Marriott, great big comfortable Hotel, brunch in dining room, few hours rest.

Taxi to downtown shabby Hollywood to join our Starline Tour at Chinese Theatre. People everywhere, all nations and sizes, all touting, or avoiding 'in your face' persuasion. Quick look at Madam Trussard Movie Stars, V.G. Walk of Fame.

On board our small open air vehicle thru Sunset Blvd to Beverly Hills. George our tour guide regaled us with history - facts - figures - and scandles of stars, whose homes we passed, mostly seeing only gates, hedges, the odd roof top plus many security cameras, hung from trees or in hedges. Many homes visible, all beautifully maintained, each street lined with a different species of tree, nature strips filled with flowers and ferns. George had music or song, relating to each stars homes. e.g. Frank Sinatra' which was easily seen, he played "My Way."

The Tour was FAB, never laughed so much. Only saw the Hollywood sign on the hill from a viewing area, no go there these days. Large billboards along Freeways "Save every drop" also in restrooms and hotels, California in drought for 4 years.

26/5 Small Tour bus picked us from Marriott. eight lanes chocked, to beautiful Santa Monica - on Santa Monica Blvd, past the Pier snaking out into the Pacific. Palatial hotels, shops, cars, on to Wilshire Blvd. Past Getty Museum high on hill, to interstate Freeway, looking down to San Ferando Vally, past Hollywood Studios, climbing up to Universal Studios. Brief stop, photos, past Hollywood Bowl to Sunset Blvd. to Beverly Hills. Down Rodeo Drive - beautiful shops, sidewalks empty, no one carrying classy shopping bags! Return to L.A. past Fox Studios, Wilshire Golf Course, crossed over Nth and Sth 8 lane freeways, all a parking lot!

27/5 Left Marriott L.A., overcast with Marine Layer. Sun appears around noon. Patsy at the wheel, heading North to destination Santa Maria. Long drive with Pacific Ocean on left, foothills on right. Some planting and cattle in areas. Two hours or so, into affluent, seaside Santo Barbara. Rolling hills, grazing cattle, green vineyards, towering palms and Spanish mission style architecture. Lunch at the historic "Stearns Wharf" - restaurants, souvenir shops over the Pacific. Onto Santa Maria, Patsy and husband Gene's home. Much talk, drinks, food.

28/5 My birthday. Explore a little of Santa Maria, neat wide streets, very few 2 storey houses as is Patsy and Gene's. Mostly timber or stucco, very much Spanish influence. Large supermarkets, easy driving. The Michael Jackson trial was held in the Court House which swelled the population somewhat at the time. The Historic Santa Maria Inn built 1917 operating with 164 deluxe guestrooms. The elegance of a bygone era is evident in the reception, lounge, dining room and bar, with original timber panelling, beautiful ceilings etc. Plus many photos and memorable objects of past movie stars, who stayed, to break the journey from L.A. to San Francisco. 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## A FINE FEAT

### Black Head Surf Life Saving Club's First Surfboat.

At the annual general meeting held in September 1928, Black Head Surf Club committee was pleased to announce the club's finances to be in a 'healthy position' and with the balance being in credit it was put forward to purchase a surf boat, something considered to be 'a most important article'.<sup>1</sup> Understanding the expenditure would be substantial, with the additional cost of transportation and housing, the decision had to be made whether to purchase a new or second-hand boat.

Passenger and cargo steamship the 'Uki' moored at Taree, possibly at the Chatham wharf. This trip was one of many she made up and down the coast between Sydney and Brisbane. It was the 2nd January 1929 and on board was the coveted surf boat. On her way north the 'Uki' had stopped at Black Head with the intention of delivering the boat directly to the surf club, regrettably nobody was there to meet her. The boat, originally named 'Akubra', had been purchased from Queenscliff surf club. It was reported to be twenty feet in length and built by Morrison and Sinclair at Balmain. Mr Sinclair stated he 'considers her to be one of the best boats ever turned out of his yard'.<sup>2</sup> Keen to take possession of the new boat, Will Cause and Eric Erickson both of Black Head, 'in a fine feat of seamanship and endurance' decided to deliver the boat themselves by rowing it from Taree to Black Head.<sup>3</sup>

At approximately seven in the morning, on Saturday 5th January 1929, Will and Eric rowed the surf boat across the Old Bar outlet and encountered the worst circumstances; an ocean lumpy with swell, a strong southerly wind and, unfortunately, they had just missed out on procuring a tow by the 'Uki' now heading south. Most thought the men would turn around, head back to the calm waters of the river and wait for the weather and seas to abate, but Will and Eric had a 'give it a go' attitude and decided to continue rowing. The southerly wind whipping their skin with the ocean's spray caused by the boat launching over and punching through protuberant waves. Unwieldy oars ploughed through the tumbling sea, the walloping from the southerly appearing to chastise Will and Eric for daring to challenge it, instead it would bring cool relief to overworked muscles. They fought to keep the boat on an even keel, to advance quickly for an easier row and longer forward momentum. Hugging the coastline and keeping just on the seaside of breaking waves, they took advantage of every piece of shelter presented to them as they headed toward Black Head. Wallaby Point and Saltwater Point were major obstacles but once passed, the weather and ocean conditions started to turn in their favour. By the time Will and Eric had reached Red Head headland the wind had almost subsided and after four and a half hours, at midday, the surf boat was hauled on to Black Head beach.

The next day the new surf boat was given an unofficial trial by several members and most were keen to become part of the first boat crew of Black Head Surf Club. Bert Cook, an experienced boatman, demonstrated his skills; handling the boat with the '29ft [sic] steer oar' (now known as the sweep-oar) and by coaching members with aspirations of becoming rowers.<sup>4</sup> Known successful candidates were: Bert Cook (Capt.), William (Will) Cause, George Zaunders, Clarrie Meskell and C. Cook.<sup>5</sup> The surf boat was renamed 'Kerrewa' a local Aboriginal word for 'goanna', however it was later discovered by Mr George Hill, from the late Tommy Boomer, that 'Kerrewa' was also the name local Aboriginal people called Black Head.

In just over three years since its foundation, Black Head Surf Life Saving Club was steadily expanding in memberships and importantly, rescue equipment. A new shed was built to house the boat costing the club £25 (approximately \$52 in today's money) and with the 'long desired boat' now in possession, the club's focus turned to extensions and additions to the club house.

The Santa Maria Valley is lush with acres and acres of strawberries, blueberries, broccoli, cabbage. We bought many berries at roadside stalls - large, cheap and beautiful! Birthday dinner, plus Moet of course. Gene opens the bar at 3pm, managed to handle the custom. Much Californian wine tasted

29/5 Lazy day, Gene took us to local Mexican Restuarant for lunch, busy with local people, interesting food and atmosphere.

30/5 Down town to annual Elks Parade - Marching bands, dancing horses, floats etc. Most enjoyable - big crowd, Mexicans predominate. After lunch, drove 14 miles to Oceano, mostly farming. Arrived at a large wooden hall "The Great American Melodrama" created 20 years ago, such talent, enthusiasm of the actors, some who took two roles, and did front of house plus manned the bar. Marvellous!! Home to Genes' Southern Fried Chicken and drinks.

31/5 Late up, big breakfast. Gene (again) scrambled eggs with hot peppers, small sausages, fruit and biscuits [much like scones]. Patsy at the wheel, Claire and I, set out 12 noon heading north on freeway 101 to St Louis, then onto Cambria, a quaint town, with stately pines, ocean views, now a haven for artists, musicians, and writers, and many antique shops and cafes, which bring many tourists. Our big house for two nights, one mile inland on slight hill overlooking the Pacific. Three bedrooms, three bathrooms and big deck. V.G. for three 'ladies'.

Many large modern beach houses, cling to the coastline, spreading upland. Most appear to be empty.

1/6 Beautiful morning - sun shining. By 9am the Marine Layer rolled like a fog. Drove to Hearst Castle, parked. Bus to the dwellings

winding up a 1,600 ft. mountain overlooking San Simeon. We did the "Grand Rooms Tour - Drawing, Refectory, Billard rooms, and the theatre, where we saw a short film of people of a bygone era enjoying the Castle. Most amazing place. Another movie in the grounds. "Building the Dream" was a brief history of the man and architect, materials and furniture etc. sourced from around the world. Fantastic!

Three miles north of the Castle at San Simeon lies a scenic stretch of black sand beach where hundreds of Elephant Seals line the water's edge on top of each other. Some alone on the sand, flipping sand over themselves. This time of year they are molting. Other times they come to breed.

Bought food for dinner from amazing Deli on top of hill. Sunset over the sea, disappeared at 8.10pm from our house in Cambria.

2/6 No visibility over ocean, thick Marine Layer. Temp 67F (about 18C). Explored streets of Cambria. Old timber buildings, very few people, many clever, interesting shops and cafes. Did some shopping, lunch in great cafe and back to house. 3pm bar open. Much talk about families, secrets and memories. We are all first cousins so much water under the bridge. Light dinner, early to bed.

3/6 Left Cambria, after more souvenirs and coffee to Morro Bay named for Morro Rock, a dome shaped volcanic peak which rises out of the Pacific Ocean 578 feet above the harbour. Cafes line the waterfront, whale watching, kayaks many souvenir shops. Great lunch overlooking the Rock.

Lovely drive south, back to Santa Maria. Gene had BBQ ready and bar open 3.30pm.
